“CGGS3” the record-high number of participants was held !

~For Peaceful, Beautiful and Bountiful Seas~

On October 31st and on November 1st, The Japan Coast Guard and The Nippon Foundation co-hosted the 3rd Coast Guard Global Summit (CGGS3) in Tokyo. Heads from 96 coast guard agencies and related organizations participated. From the Japan Coast Guard and The Nippon Foundation, Commandant Shohei ISHII and Chairman Yohei SASAKAWA attended respectively. Commandant ISHII presided over the Summit as the chair.

At the summit, the heads

- Recalled the importance of strengthening cooperation among the coast guard agencies, enhancing dialogue, and concentrating wisdom, technology, and knowledge from around the world.
- Supported the amendments of the meeting guidelines and affirmed its determination to maintain this summit as a functional and sustainable framework.
- Supported the establishment and official launch of a dedicated website for sharing useful information on advanced best practices, experiences, and human resource development.
- Supported continuous implementation of human resource development online programs with exploring methods with highly educational effectiveness and the utilization of dedicated website.
- Deepened knowledge on initiatives and measures for utilization of advanced technologies such as unmanned/autonomous ships, and recognized their potential and applicability.

3 Summary of results

(1) Meeting Guidelines

In order to make this summit a more functional and sustainable framework, the heads supported a proposal to amend the meeting guidelines, including contents of allowing meetings to be held online or in a hybrid format and clarifying roles and responsibilities of host and how to determine the venue, etc..

(2) Information Sharing Method

The website, which has been developed to promote information sharing and capacity building among the world's coast guard agencies by sharing advanced best practices, experiences, and useful information for human resource development in each country, was supported and will be launched officially.

(3) Coast Guard Global Human Resource Development

Regarding the online program (keynote speeches and panel discussions that can be attended by officers of the world's coast guard agencies) that have been implemented under the idea of "New Educational Opportunity", the status of progress and evaluation were reported. The heads confirmed its effectiveness and supported to continue to implement the program while exploring methods with higher educational effectiveness such as requesting for participation of the experts of education belonging to academies and educational institutes of coast guard agencies.

In addition, it was also supported utilization of the above-mentioned dedicated website as a platform to promote human resource development by uploading information of educational institutions and academies of coast guard agencies and enhancing its contents.

(4) Pioneer Activities

Based on subtitle of "How to utilize the Unmanned/Autonomous Ships/its technologies for Coast Guard Missions", International Maritime Organization gave a presentation about the progress of discussions on regulating autonomous ships, and The Nippon Foundation gave a presentation about the outline of the fully autonomous ship project "MEGURI2040". Also, advanced activities were shared from Australia, France, Norway, the United Kingdom and the United States.

As best practice, there were presentations from Italy on lessons learned from COVID-19 and preparedness for the next pandemic, from Türkiye on combating against irregular migration at sea, and from the Regional Cooperation Agreement on Combating Piracy and Armed Robbery against Ships in Asia on enhancing cooperation to suppress piracy and sea robbery against ships.

4 Chairperson's summary

In summing up the above discussions, the heads welcomed the further development of this summit as a global and useful platform with more agencies participating, and affirmed the need for this framework to continue making it functional effectively as a platform for cooperation among coast guards at a global scale.

The heads also recognized the importance of deepening the understanding of shared principles of conducts in the maritime sector and enhancing the coast guard capacity of the entire world in order for the Coast Guards as "the first responders and front-line actors" to overcome challenges that world is facing and hand over

the “Peaceful, Beautiful and Bountiful Seas” to the next generation.

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Chairman's Summary
The 3rd Coast Guard Global Summit
Tokyo, Japan, October 31 and November 1, 2023

1. The heads of coast guards, agencies with coast guard functions, international or regional organizations with responsibilities dealing with coast guard functions, and related agencies in Africa, the Americas, Asia, Europe, and Oceania (hereinafter referred to as the "Coast Guards") took part in the third meeting of the Coast Guard Global Summit (hereinafter referred to as the "CGGS") held on October 31 and November 1, 2023 in Tokyo, Japan. The Summit was chaired by Commandant Shohei Ishii of the Japan Coast Guard.
2. The heads of the Coast Guards reaffirmed that maritime safety and security and a clean marine environment are the vital foundation for the well-being and prosperity of the international community as a whole.
3. The heads of the Coast Guards reaffirmed that ensuring safety of life at sea, providing readiness for maritime distress and disaster response, protecting the marine environment, and maintaining maritime order based on the rule of law at sea under international maritime law are an essential foundation for people utilizing the ocean with ease to enjoy various benefits all over the world.
4. The heads of the Coast Guards recalled the recognition made in the first CGGS: the importance of enhancing dialogue and cooperation among the Coast Guards worldwide beyond existing regional frameworks, and of concentrating the entire regions' wisdom, experience and knowledge to overcome challenges that the world is facing.
5. The heads of the Coast Guards recognized the need and urgency to broadly respond to the challenges facing the world today included in the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals

(SDGs), such as global climate change, threats to the environment, illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing, social instability posed by organized crime, infectious pandemics, and changes in the navigational environment in which new technologies are constantly evolving, etc.

6. The heads of the Coast Guards deepened insight of the automated navigation technologies including MASS, on the status of regulatory development, progress of a major initiative for social implementation, the examples of utilization in coast guard missions, through presentations from agencies and organizations with pioneering expertise and experiences. The heads also recognized the importance of addressing challenges being faced or anticipated, such as preparation for the next infectious disease based on the COVID-19 pandemic experience as well as irregular migration. Furthermore, the heads reaffirmed that piracy and armed robbery against ships which are a universal threat to humankind, have remained an existing threat thus continuous and cooperative responses are indispensable.
7. The heads of the Coast Guards supported the amendments of the CGGS Meeting Guidelines that was reported after discussions at the second CGGS Working Level Meeting (hereinafter referred to as the “CGGS WLM”) and the correspondence group meetings. Also, the heads affirmed their determination to operate the revised Guidelines appropriately and maintain the CGGS as a functional and sustainable framework.
8. The heads of the Coast Guards affirmed the establishment of the CGGS Website which was reported after discussions at the second CGGS WLM and the correspondence group meetings, and supported its launch. The Website is designed to share advanced best practices and experiences as well as useful information for coast guard global human resource development.
9. The heads of the Coast Guards recognized the importance of the “New Educational Opportunity”₂ proposed at the second CGGS,

and affirmed the usefulness of the online program which has been conducted after discussions at the second CGGS WLM and by the Core Member Group for the Coast Guard Global Human Resources Development, based on the current fact that it has been repeatedly held with many participants from around the world, and also supported its continuous implementation while exploring methods with higher educational effectiveness. Also, the heads supported the measures for use of the CGGS Website for coast guard global human resource development.

10. Regarding the next CGGS meeting, the heads of the Coast Guards supported to set a certain period for consideration, and then to coordinate it among related countries, including the support secretariat, during that period, based on the revised CGGS Meeting Guidelines.
11. The heads of the Coast Guards welcomed the further development of the CGGS as a global and useful platform with more agencies participating. The heads recognized that the CGGS had become more functional and sustainable as a result of the achievements at the third CGGS—revision of the CGGS Meeting Guidelines, establishment of the Website, and implementing policy related to the Online Program for coast guard global human resource development—and affirmed the need to continue making it functional effectively as a platform for cooperation among coast guards at the global scale. In addition, the heads recognized anew the importance of deepening the understanding of shared principles of conducts in the maritime sector and enhancing the coast guard capacity of the entire world in order for the Coast Guards as “the first responders and frontline actors” to overcome challenges that the world is facing and hand over the “Peaceful, Beautiful and Bountiful Seas” to the next generation.
12. This is a summary made by the chairman of the third CGGS with unanimous support from the heads of the Coast Guards participated.
